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



Pastoral from the Pastor



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Dear friends in Christ at Peace and Grue,

Luther flaunts it rather than hides it: The Christian way of life leads to repentance and promises resurrection every day. Life on these terms is rigorous and demanding. It consumes the resources of faith at an astonishing rate. It is not surprising, then, that weariness, doubt, and unfaithfulness are familiar companions to Christians. No Christian can escape these enemies. It takes a strong and healthy faith to contend with them. A faith that needs regular nourishment. For this reason Christians regularly gather with other believers to speak and hear the gospel-the message about the life and death and resurrection of Jesus. In doing so they remind themselves of the promises attached to the sacrament of Baptism. When they are hungry and in need of solid food, they turn to the other sacrament, a meal provided by Jesus Christ himself. This meal, like a meal eaten by the side of the road, is food for travelers who are on the way from repentance to resurrection, from death to life.

Christians have many names for this meal. It is sometimes called the Sacrament of the Altar to emphasize the importance of Christ's sacrifice for our sin. It is referred to as Holy Communion to accent the intimate bond created between those who come to the meal and its host. In recent years, some Lutherans have begun to use the term "Eucharist," a Greek term for "thanksgiving." The name for this sacrament most often used in the New Testament is the Lord's Supper. This name identifies the two main components of this sacrament. First it identifies whose supper it is: the LORD'S supper, not ours. Second it is the Lord's SUPPER: It is a meal eaten in faith in God's promise to save.

The New Testament teaches that on the night before he was put to death, Jesus took bread and a cup of wine and promised his followers that he would be with them in these things. As with the water of Baptism, bread and wine would be no more than ordinary food without this promise to save. This saving presence is there for us even if we should despise or not believe the promise of this meal, because the word and the promise depends on God not on us and our ability to create what we think is faith or trust. How Jesus will be present he does not say, and speculation about that often creates more difficulties than it resolves.

Jesus meets us for a specific purpose. He comes to feed and nourish us in the faith that in his death he has won the forgiveness of our sins and the sure hope in the resurrection from the dead. When he said of both the bread and the wine, "Do this in remembrance of me," he was not simply asking us to remember him. He is proclaiming clearly to us the saving events of his death and resurrection. As St. Paul wrote, "For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes again" (1 Corinthians 11:26).

Yes, just a bit of bread and a sip of wine. No doubt it is hard on us proud beings to be reduced to this, and to think that our eternal salvation hangs in the balance. But so it is and so we come together actually to proclaim it. But don't overlook that last part: until he comes. For there lies the real aim of the meal that was interrupted by death, as all things will interrupted by death. But this meal we are promised will be concluded. So come, eat, drink, and proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

And with that we come to the end of our review of the five main parts of Luther's Small Catechism.

The 2025 WELCA books are ready and you can yours up in the Narthex.

The Synod WELCA newsletter was just printed highlighting the Synod Conference last September. Carol Balk is our new NW Synod WELCA President. Carol will be visiting all of our Synod Conferences during the Spring and Fall Gatherings. Two items she is asking our WELCA groups to add to our budget for the year: 1. Katie's Fund, established in honor of Martin Luther's wife, Katie Von Bora is an endowment that supports ministry for leadership, global connections and living theology. 2. ELCA World Hunger, celebrating its 50th year this year and reminds us that there are 37.9 million people living in hunger in our country of America. Peace WELCA does send funds to the NW Synod each year and, even though, we do have a challenging budget for this coming year, we will be mindful of these two funds when we disburse funds at the end of the year.

Christmas 2024 is past; however, as Pastor Dan indicated in his first message of the new year, Christmas is not over, it should be a part of us all year. So even though we are a month into the new year, there was

an article describing a Christmas song in the Otter Tail Country Living magazine I would like to share with you. A Tapestry of Tradition and Faith. As we sing along to the British Christmas song of "The Twelve Days of Christmas" during the holiday season, we are not merely reciting a repetitive list of presents. Instead, we are weaving through a tapestry of religious symbolism and tradition, reminding us of the essence of Christmas beyond material gifts. It is a celebration of faith, love and the enduring values that have shaped cultures and communities for centuries.

- 1. Partridge in a Pear Tree : The partridge symbolizes Christ and the pear tree represents the cross, signifying salvation.
- 2. Two Turtle Doves: These doves are reminiscent of the Old and New Testaments, emphasizing the harmony between the two.
- 3. Three French Hens: These hens stand for the theological virtues of faith, hope and charity.
- 4. These birds are believed to represent the four gospels, Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.
- 5. Five Golden Rings: The rings symbolize the first five books of the Old Testament, also known as the Torah.
- 6. Six Geese a-Laying: These geese represent the six days of creation, emphasizing God's great power.
- 7. Seven Swans a-Swimming: The seven swans are often associated with the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit in Christian theology.
- 8. Eight Maids a-Milking: These maids represent the eight beatitudes, teachings of Jesus that offer happiness and blessings.
- 9. Nine Ladies Dancing: These ladies are representative of the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit, love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.
- 10. Ten Lords a-Leaping: The ten lords represent the Ten Commandments, fundamental principles guiding moral behavior.
- 11. Eleven Pipers Piping: These pipers signify the eleven faithful apostles who remained loyal to Jesus after Judas' betrayal.
- 12. Twelve Drummers Drumming: The twelve drummers represent the twelve points of belief in the Apostle's Creed, a statement of Christian faith.

So, the next time we find ourselves humming this festive tune, let's remember the meaning behind each verse, and let the Twelve Days of Christmas inspire us to embrace the spirit of generosity, kindness and faith that truly defines this magical time of the year.


